ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE (DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS).

-Adult, female blonde lab/poodle mix with no identification has a matted hair coat. The mats are close against the skin on the neck, entire body, and all four limbs. There is some stool in the coat of this dog around the rear end.
-Adult, male apricot Standard Poodle with chip number OAO2236002 has a matted hair coat. The mats are close to the skin on all four lower legs and feet.
-Adult, female light apricot golden retriever/poodle mix with chip number 048 269 302 has a matted coat. The mats are close to the skin and are on all four lower legs and feet.
Matted hair can cause skin infections and become painful. In addition, matted coats do not provide complete protection against the elements. The licensee must remove the matted hair. As part of the facility's program of veterinary care, the licensee must develop and follow a program of hair coat maintenance to ensure that animals are cleaned when their hair coats become soiled and that matted hair is removed on a regular basis. To be corrected by 30 March 2015.

TIME AND METHOD OF IDENTIFICATION.

The one Labrador/poodle mix cited under 2.40 (b) (2) did not have identification at the time of the inspection. Correct identification is crucial to know a dogs identity for certain during the process of and follow-up after an inspection. The licensee must identify all live dogs and cats on the premises. To be corrected by 7 April 2015.

RECORDS: DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS.

The identification numbers for six of 34 dogs listed on the Dogs on Hand form are not recorded on this form. Information such as dog identification numbers allows for the tracking and monitoring of the animals in the kennel. The Dogs on Hand form must fully and correctly include all information for all dogs present in the kennel. Correct by 7 April 2015.

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3.1(a) REPEAT

HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

There are holes in the dirt floor of four enclosures: One enclosure on the north side of the facility has a hole under the wooden enclosure divider leaving a gap between the divider and the ground. There is one enclosure on the east side of the facility with a hole that undermines the cement apron in front of the shelter structure. This enclosure houses one young puppy in addition to the adult. There are two outdoor portions of the sheltered building with holes undermining the cement or a support beam, creating a gap. Holes under fences and structures can cause injury to dogs who try to crawl in the space between the fence/structure and the ground. Holes under fences can also allow dogs to escape the enclosure or other animals to gain access to the enclosure.

There is an exposed screw head (about 1 inch in length) at head level in the outdoor enclosure housing a female lab and her puppies. There are two exposed nail heads (also at least one inch in length) just above head level in the indoor portion of one of the sheltered enclosures.

The licensee must maintain the facility in good repair to protect the animals from injury and to contain the animals securely.

3.4(a)(1)(3)

OUTDOOR HOUSING FACILITIES.

Two litters of puppies were whelped and are being raised in outdoor housing facilities. The practice of whelping and raising young dogs in outdoor housing facilities has not been specifically approved by the attending veterinarian. Approval by the attending veterinarian ensures that appropriate housing is provided to young dogs. The housing of sick, infirm, aged or young dogs in outdoor housing facilities must be specifically approved by the attending veterinarian. Correct by 7 April 2015

3.4(b)(1)

OUTDOOR HOUSING FACILITIES.

The entrances of two outdoor shelter structures are open to the elements. Shelter structures with entrances open to the elements may not provide adequate protection from the cold. All shelter structures must provide dogs with adequate protection and shelter from the cold and heat. Correct by 7 April 2015.
