RECORDS: DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS.

The acquisition records are not up to date. There was no record of acquisition for the one Australian opossum. The acquisition records accounted for 6 rabbits. At least sixteen rabbits were counted during the inspections. One enclosure housed adult guinea pigs with offspring. The acquisition records reviewed did not include any offspring born at the premises. Complete and accurate acquisition records must be kept to allow accurate identification of the animals and to allow medical and legal tracking. The facility shall make, keep and maintain records that fully and correctly include all required acquisition information and they shall include any offspring born of any animal at the facility. Correct by Oct. 17th, 2019.

FACILITIES, OUTDOOR.

Several rabbits were observed to be taking shelter to avoid direct sunlight. Two rabbits in the enclosure were seen to have elevated respiratory rates (approximately 160 breaths per minute) and were stretched out on their sides. A kestrel was placed at the level of one of the rabbits and measured 99.6F. Refrigerated carrots were brought out and used to lure the rabbits out of their shelter. Once they began consuming the carrots, their behaviors normalized and their respiratory rates lowered. Rabbits are sensitive to excessive heat and prone to heat stress. Heat stress is detrimental to the health and welfare of animals. Licensees shall provide artificial cooling when the atmospheric temperature exceeds 90 degrees Fahrenheit. Correct by September 20th, 2019.

FEEDING.

The current diet fed to the marmosets is a homemade diet consisting of shrimp or ham, cheese, fruit, cereal and applesauce. No commercial marmoset diet is being fed. No veterinary nutritional evaluation of the current diet has been made. Marmosets require very specific levels of vitamins C and D in their diet to maintain a healthy condition and to meet their normal daily nutritional requirements. The diet for the marmosets must be appropriate for marmosets according to generally accepted professional and husbandry practices and nutritional standards. Correct by Oct. 17th, 2019.
