ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE (DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS).

- The licensee uses a veterinarian under consulting arrangements to provide veterinary care for the animals but does not have a formal agreement nor a written program of veterinary care. The last recorded visit to the facility from a licensed veterinarian was 3-2-2006. The licensee does not have written guidance from the attending veterinarian to provide preventative care or treatment for routine and common veterinary problems. In order to ensure problems of animal health are addressed adequately, a written program of veterinary care should include the species housed and used in regulated activities, what common health problems they may have and how these will be addressed (eg. by the licensee or the attending veterinarian (AV)). If the licensee is to provide veterinary care to the animals for common health problems, how this will be identified, what treatment will be provided (medication, dose, route, frequency, duration), and, if not resolved by that treatment, that the AV will be contacted for further guidance. Each dealer shall employ an attending veterinarian under formal arrangements. In the case of a part-time attending veterinarian or consultant arrangements, the formal arrangements shall include a written program of veterinary care and regularly scheduled visits to the premises of the dealer.

ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE (DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS).

- - There is a 15 year old female capuchin identified as "Elizabeth" housed with another primate. Upon inspection, Elizabeth's rump and legs as well as flank area is observed to be missing patches of hair. The licensee states this has been present for approximately 6 weeks. Abnormal conditions to the haircoat may indicate improper social group housing, poor diet or psychological abnormalities in primates that can lead to additional health problems for the animal. The female capuchin "Elizabeth" must be examined by a veterinarian and appropriate treatment administered. Documentation must be maintained for any health related problems and it must include the following information:

- Identity of the animal.
- Descriptions of the illness or injury.
- Dates, details, and results of examinations, tests, and other such procedures.

- The following medications stored in current drug storage area were past the expiration date:

Ace 25 mg Expired 4-8-10

Ampicillin inj (polyflex) Expired 8- 97

Prednisone liquid suspension Expired 12-11-08

An unlabeled syringe of an unknown medication with an unknown dose and an unknown expiration date.

These medications were intermingled with other pharmaceuticals that are currently being used in the sheltered facility

and are therefore ready for use.

Use of expired medications is not be an appropriate method to prevent, control, and treat diseases and injuries since the expected results cannot be guaranteed and the animals may experience pain and distress due to mistreatment, unrelieved symptoms, or due to unexpected side effects.

The licensee must ensure that all medications used in the facility are not expired and labeled properly in accordance with standard veterinary practices and manufacturer's recommendations.

- There is not a current animal inventory list present. The last list of inventoried animals was dated 2011. The records need to be kept up to date so that the animals can be properly traced. Correct by 7/1/14

ENVIRONMENT ENHANCEMENT TO PROMOTE PSYCHOLOGICAL WELL-BEING.

- Environmental enrichment. The physical environment in the primary enclosures must be enriched by providing means of expressing noninjurious species-typical activities. Species differences should be considered when determining the type or methods of enrichment. Examples of environmental enrichments include providing perches, swings, mirrors, and other increased cage complexities; providing objects to manipulate; varied food items; using foraging or task-oriented feeding methods; and providing interaction with the care giver or other familiar and knowledgeable person consistent with personnel safety precautions.

Inspection Report

- The environmental enrichment provided to the nonhuman primates is not adequate. There is no plan denoting the enrichment and no log book or calendar showing that enrichment takes place. The animals have different items in their enclosures, but there is no schedule of rotating or changing the items in the pens. The enrichment must be documented on the environmental enhancement plan, and the plan must be completely developed, signed by the attending veterinarian and followed.

FACILITIES, GENERAL.

- Open food storage bags where present on a shelf above the pig as well as above the rabbits. Open feed is an attractant for rodents and pests, which could lead to contamination of stored feed. The open bags of feed must be stored and protected to prevent contamination by vermin, mold or deterioration.

- At the time of the inspection there were two boxes of produce sitting on the floor in front of the refrigerator. The licensee stated she had received 6 boxes of produce on Friday but had not made it through the last two boxes. These boxes had been unrefrigerated for 48 plus hours. This is a potential source of contamination. Refrigeration shall be provided for supplies of perishable food.
